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“Sepsis can affect anyone at any time. It starts when the immune system overreacts to an infection and begins to damage the body itself, leading to organ failure and in some cases death. The UK Sepsis Trust estimates that there are around 150,000 cases of sepsis in the UK every year and it kills around 44,000 people per year.” NICE, July 2016

In July 2016 NICE published the ‘Sepsis: recognition, diagnosis and early management’ guidelines. The guideline will help healthcare professionals working in any NHS setting to recognise sepsis so they can provide early treatment. The guideline recommendations cover:

- Identifying people with suspected sepsis
- Risk factors for sepsis
- Face-to-face assessment of people with suspected sepsis
- Stratifying risk of severe illness or death from sepsis
- Managing suspected sepsis outside acute hospital settings
- Managing and treating suspected sepsis in acute hospital settings
- Antibiotic treatment in people with suspected sepsis
- Intravenous fluids in people with suspected sepsis
- Using oxygen in people with suspected sepsis
- Finding the source of infection in people with suspected sepsis
- Information and support for people with sepsis and their families and carers
- Training and education

Dr Ron Daniels, chief executive of the UK Sepsis Trust welcomed the guideline as a chance to effect change and said: “We must act decisively to save many of the thousands of lives claimed every year.” NICE, July 2016

This masterclass will explore evidence behind interventions, barriers to reliable delivery and solutions in the context of the Surviving Sepsis Campaign guidelines and the NEW NICE recommendations.

The roles of individual health professionals within acute hospitals, the community and the prehospital environment will be explored to aid understanding and planning of a system-wide response. The day will also outline national and global strategies to embed sepsis as a clinical priority for health systems.

The facilitator for the masterclass is Dr Ron Daniels. Ron Daniels is a full time NHS Consultant in Intensive Care and Anaesthesia, based in Birmingham. He’s also Chief Executive of the UK Sepsis Trust and the Global Sepsis Alliance. In 2016 he was awarded the British Empire Medal for services to patients.

Ron is Chief Executive of the Global Sepsis Alliance, having been instrumental in bringing World Sepsis Day and the Chairman’s concept of the World Sepsis Declaration to fruition. He is Chief Executive of the United Kingdom Sepsis Trust, a registered charity, in which capacity he provides in addition to public duties clinical advice to NHS England, the Department of Health and to the Parliamentary and Health Service Ombudsman. He has lobbied the United Kingdom Government, together with devolved governments in Scotland and Wales, over several years culminating in an announcement by the Secretary of State for Health of a resourced suite of measures to transform sepsis care across the UK. Ron and his team developed both the ‘Sepsis Six’ care bundle, now in use in 12 countries, and the clinical concept of ‘Red Flag Sepsis’. Both are endorsed and recommended by the UK Royal Colleges and by NHS England.
